The organisational work for the Cabbage Patch 60th Anniversary Control-line Celebration continues as I write this. Brian Lever tells me there was a 147 point check list to be completed before everything was ready! (And you thought it was just a couple of phone calls and turn up on the day!!). Please put the date in your diary and turn up if you can, your help will be hugely appreciated. The date is June 19th. The venue is the Embankment. The time is early.

Here is some information on the **Jim Moseley Postal Event** for the **Keil Kraft Senator**. Note that there is a prize of cash money! If that isn't an incentive then I don't know what is.

First kitted by Keil Kraft in 1950, the 'Senator' has become recognised as an excellent design that combines simple robust structure with outstanding performance. Very popular in British 'Vintage' events, it also can do well in North American 'Category III' classes – Nostalgia Rubber, Moffett and Mulvihill, etc. for which 120 second maximums are a formality and it can be taken well past 180 seconds with little extra effort.

There is no entry fee. The winner will receive a minimum prize of US\$80.00, or the equivalent in any other currency – the final sum will reflect exchange rates at the close of the event but presently equates to approximately C\$100, £45.00, A\$110.00, NZ\$120.00, etc.

Further enhancement of this sum and/or provision of further prizes is dependent upon any donations received. The lengthy timescale of this Postal is to permit any modeller an opportunity to participate, no matter where in the world they might be located.

Models are to conform to the standard Senator kit plan; the structure may be amended only for the purposes of D/T installation – whether tipping stabiliser (LE down), tipping wing or hinged rear fuselage – and the undercarriage leg may be removable for storage/carrying purposes. Glazing of the 'cabin' is optional. Any freewheel propeller up to a maximum of 13" diameter may be used and there are no restrictions on rubber motor size/weight.

Three flights shall be made to a 120 second maximum. If three Maximums are achieved, then successive flights may be made with the maximum increasing by 60 seconds on each occasion, until the target time is not realised e.g. 120. 120. 120. 180. 240. 211 = Total Score 991 seconds

All flights to be pre-nominated to a timekeeper; the initial three should be made on the same day but successive fly off flights may be made at the flyer's discretion, similarly timed.

Entries/scores may be forwarded to me at any time and I will endeavour to keep participants informed with regular interim updates as well as a final report and result sheet, which will be further publicised as widely as possible. Accompanying anecdotes and photographs would be very welcome and are encouraged.

I hope that you will give this event your support and also encourage others to participate. The 'Senator' is a vice-less airplane, easy to build and to fly with very satisfying performance; my only advice is to keep the structure aft of the CG as light as possible to reduce the need for any nose ballast to a minimum.

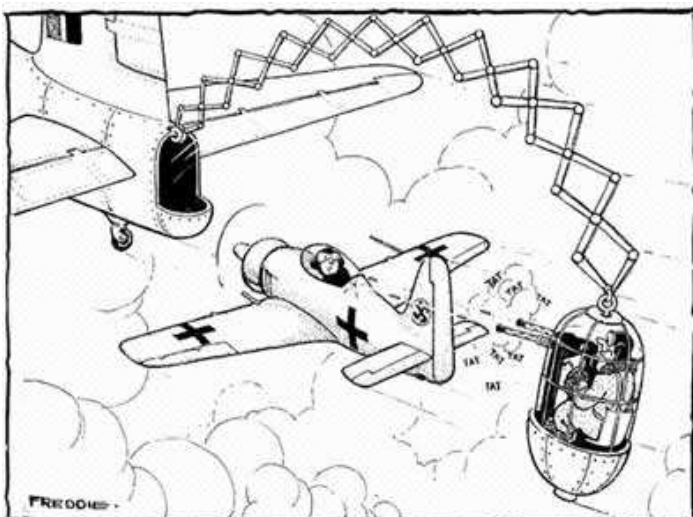

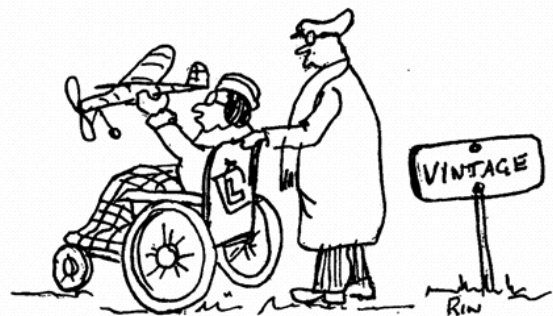

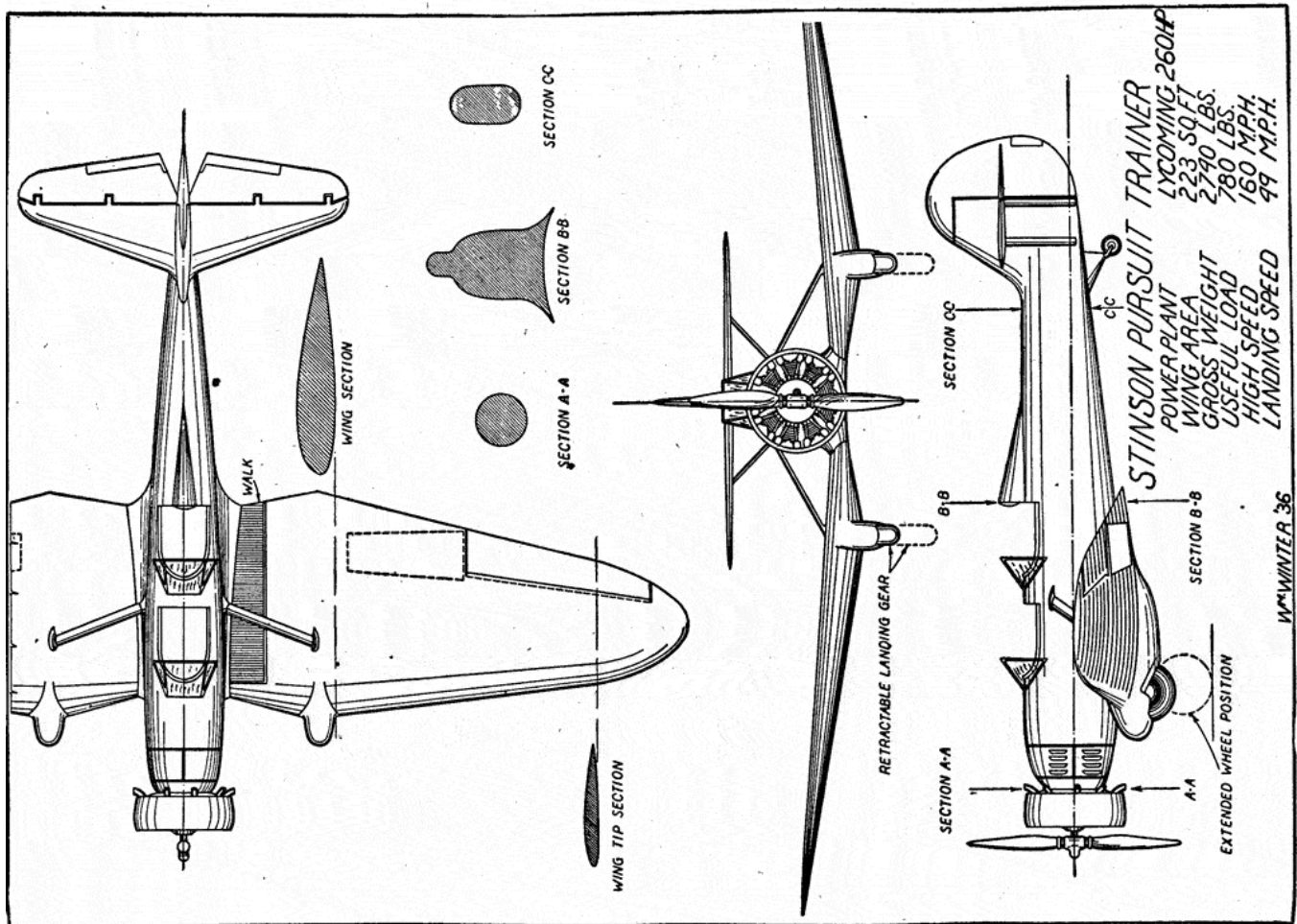

Using li-polys and Ted's Timer?

This came from an internet forum and, given the current price of fuel, I thought it an interesting piece of information

500 miles per gallon of gasoline using existing technology-

By combining existing hybrid gas/electric @40-50 MPG with dual fuel gas/grain alcohol engines present technology can produce vehicles that achieve 500 MPG of gasoline.

Of course the alcohol fuel distilleries/infrastructure has to be put into place, probably by government subsidy, but if it limits the domestic demand for petrol, and adds a new revenue stream for existing oil companies, it might be an option. For the home farm, it also means home generated fuel from agricultural waste. (stalks, chaff, etc) Interesting proposition.

But and that is a big BUT, will the oil companies allow that to happen?

They have not spent one iota of their money to investigate alternate sources of fuel and although some use Alcohol as an additive, alcohol is still a partially burned fuel (it contains oxygen as a constituent part of the formula) pre oxygenated means pre burned....and cannot under any circumstances produce the mileage that is obtainable from pure mixed hydrocarbons C4 to C12. The reason that diesels get such good mileage is the fuel itself it runs from C10 to C25 and contains far more carbon than hydrogen and that is where mileage comes from. Today's gasolines are far more finely refined than what was available in the fifties and sixties and the higher molecular weight HCs are cracked down to C6 and C7 to produce more gasoline but less mileage. New Gasoline contains very few molecules of C8 or above and that is where the mileage went. So now you know.

You can just telephone this order to Maplins on 0870-429-6000 between 0800-2200 hrs and pay with debit card or credit card over the phone.

There is no minimum order , however a minimum postal charge of £2.50 is applicable if the order total is less than £35.00. The additional battery box component with switch is a new modification which makes using the timer a lot simpler for another 99p !

I'm afraid you still have to go to WH Smiths to buy a 99p packet of brass paper fasteners as Maplins don't do stationary items....

.Go on, build one of these timers and leave it permanently in the model and get into Lithium free flight power !

Watch out for my purple Stosser free flight model on Friday evening at Ferry Meadows and see how well it flies on the tiny £6.00 90 mA lithium cell and £ 9.99 Falcon PU04 motor /gearbox and folding prop combination which are available from Flighthook.

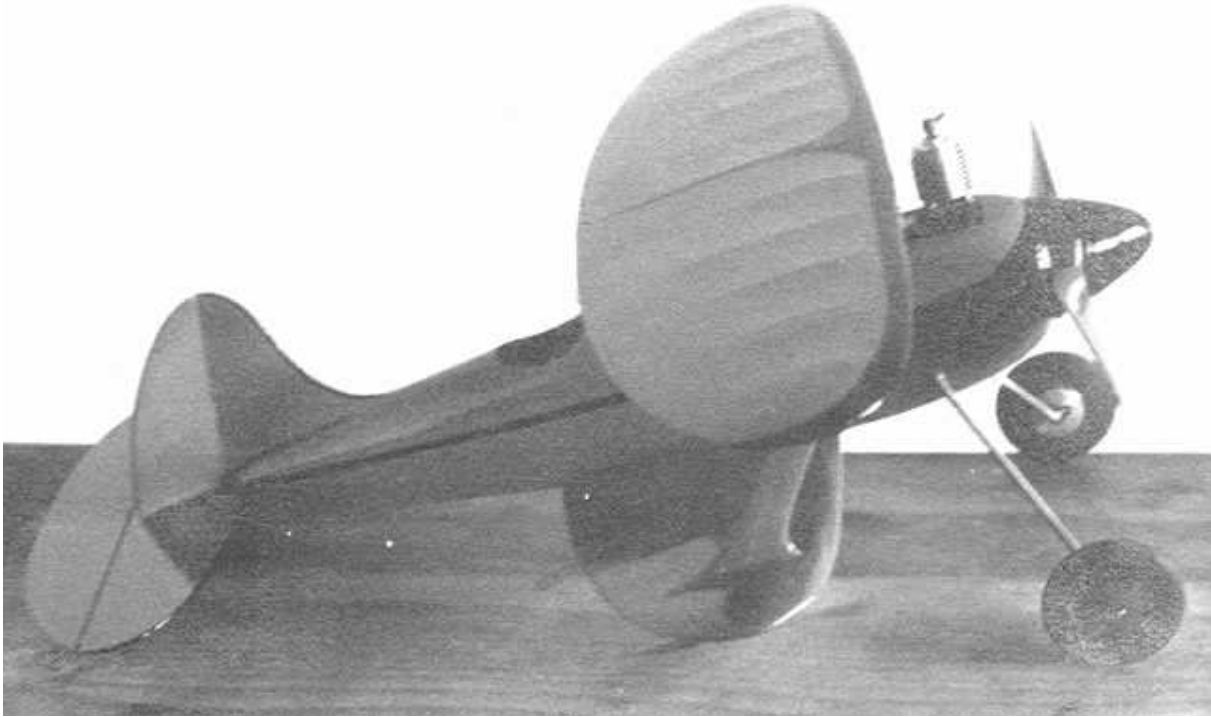
